Liverpool may have the answers. It was the clear winner of our annual survey for the first time this year – and the only city or town to score five stars in three categories: value for money, shopping and cultural attractions.

And when we also asked you to rate the nation's best museums and galleries, we found that an impressive six were located within Liverpool's city limits.

That said, the country's top museums are spread far and wide, from the the popular open-air St Fagans in Cardiff and Beamish (near Newcastle), with their brick-by-brick reconstructions of historic buildings, to the awesome exhibits at the National Railway Museum in York.

The city on the Mersey emerges victorious. Its five-star ratings reflect what we all want from our cities: an affordable medley of culture, good food and shopping.

The refurbishment of Royal Albert Dock, after it was granted Unesco World Heritage status in 2004, triggered a general spruging-up of

the city. Industrial and waterfront buildings were reborn as galleries, creative quarters and eateries, the open-air Liverpool One shopping centre sprung up, and the city's musical heritage was celebrated in the Cavern Quarter and The Beatles Stroy

never far from an artisan bakery (head to Red Brick Market), a tasty brunch stop (try Camp and Furnace), a record shop (Probe, where Pete Burns once worked) or a world-class museum. All of this against a backdrop of the skyline-defining Three Graces buildings on the Pier Head, a mighty reminder of how it all started.
